

About National Service Scheme (NSS)

The National Service Scheme (NSS) is a Central Sector Scheme of the Government of India, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports. It provides an opportunity for student youth in the 11th and 12th classes of schools at the +2 Board level, as well as student youth in technical institutions, graduate, and post graduate levels at colleges and universities in India to take part in various government-led community service activities and programmes. The primary objective is to develop the personality and character of student youth through voluntary community service. The purpose of the NSS is **"Education through Service."** NSS was launched in 1969 in 37 universities involving about 40,000 volunteers, and it has now spread to 657 universities and 51 +2 councils / directorates, covering 20,669 colleges/ technical institutions and 11,988 senior secondary schools. Since its inception, over 7.4 crore students have benefitted from NSS.

National Service Scheme (NSS) instills the spirit of voluntary work among students and teachers through sustained community interactions, bringing academic institutions closer to society. It demonstrates how to combine knowledge and action to achieve results that

are desirable for community development. NSS is a permanent student youth programme of the Government of India, and the expenditure is shared by the Central and State Governments.

NSS was officially started on **24th September 1969** to establish a meaningful linkage between the campus and the community. Mahatma Gandhi, the Father of the Nation, had recognized that the country could not progress in a desired direction until the student youth were motivated to work for the upliftment of the villages and communities. For Gandhiji, the villages, where the majority of the population lives, represent the country. Therefore, for national reconstruction and resurgence, it was deemed fit that the students and teachers should be properly sensitized and utilized for strengthening Indian society as a whole, with particular emphasis on the rural community. Therefore, student youth, teachers, and the community are considered as the three basic components of the National Service Scheme.

History and Growth of NSS

In India, the idea of involving students in the task of national service dates back to the times of Mahatma Gandhi, the father of the nation. He suggested that instead of undertaking academic research about economic and social disability, the students should do "something positive so that the life of the villagers might be raised to a higher material and moral level."

During the year 1950, the University Grants Commission headed by Dr. Radhakrishnan recommended the introduction of national service in academic institutions on a voluntary basis with a view to developing healthy contacts between the students and teachers on the one hand and establishing a constructive linkage between the campus and the community on the other hand.

In the draft First Five Year Plan adopted by the Government of India in 1952, the need for social and labor service for students for one year was further stressed.

In 1958, the then Prime Minister Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru mooted the idea of having social service as a prerequisite for graduation.

In 1959, a draft outline of the scheme was placed before the Education Minister's Conference. The Conference was unanimous about the urgent need for trying out a workable scheme for national service.

A National Service Committee was appointed under the Chairmanship of Dr. C. D. Deshmukh on August 28, 1959, to make concrete suggestions that national service for a period of nine months to a year may be made compulsory for all students completing high school education and intending to enroll themselves in a college or a university.

In 1960, Prof. K. G. Saiyidain studied national service by students implemented in several countries of the world and submitted his report under the title "National Service for the Youth" to the Government with a number of recommendations as to what could be done in India to develop a feasible scheme of social service by students.

The Education Commission headed by Dr. D. S. Kothari (1964-66) recommended that

students at all stages of education should be associated with some form of social service. This was taken into account by the State Education Ministers during their conference in April 1967, and they recommended that at the university stage, students could be permitted to join the National Cadet Corps (NCC), which was already in existence on a voluntary basis, and an alternative to this could be offered to them in the form of a new programme called the National Service Scheme (NSS).

In May 1969, a conference of the student representatives of the universities and institutions of higher learning convened by the Ministry of Education and the University Grants Commission also unanimously declared that national service could be a powerful instrument for national integration. It could be used to introduce urban students to rural life.

On September 24th 1969, the then Union Education Minister Dr. V. K. R. V. Rao launched the NSS programme in 37 Universities covering all states.

Basic Concepts of NSS

The overall aim of the National Service Scheme is to provide an additional dimension to the higher education system and to orient the student youth to community service while they are studying in educational institutions. The reason for the formulation of this objective is the general realization that college and +2 level students have a tendency to become alienated from the village/slum masses, which constitute the majority of the population of the country. The educated youth who are expected to take the reins of administration in the future are found to be unaware of the problems of the village/slum community and, in certain cases, are indifferent towards their needs and problems. Therefore, it is necessary to arouse the social conscience of the students and to provide them with an opportunity to work with the people in the villages and slums. It is felt that their interaction with the common villagers and slum dwellers will expose them to the realities of life and bring about a change in their social perception.

The Motto

The motto or watchword of the National Service Scheme is **'NOT ME BUT YOU'**. This reflects the essence of democratic living and upholds the need for selfless service and appreciation of the other person's point of view, as well as showing consideration for fellow human beings. It underlines that the welfare of an individual is ultimately dependent on the welfare of society as a whole. Therefore, it should be the aim of the NSS to demonstrate this motto in its day-to-day programme.

NSS Symbol



The symbol of the National Service Scheme is based on the 'Rath' wheel of the Konark Sun Temple situated in Orissa. These giant wheels of the Sun Temple portray the cycle of creation, preservation, and release, and signify the movement in life across time and space. The design of the symbol, a simplified form of the Sun-chariot wheel, primarily depicts **movement**. The **wheel signifies the progressive cycle of life**. It stands for **continuity as well as change** and implies the continuous striving of NSS for **social transformation and upliftment**.

NSS Badge

The NSS symbol is embossed on the NSS badge. NSS volunteers wear it while undertaking any community service programme. The Konark wheel in the symbol has **eight bars**, **representing the 24 hours of the day**. Hence, the badge reminds the wearer to be ready for service to the nation round the clock, i.e., for 24 hours. The **red color** in the badge indicates that the NSS volunteers are full of blood, i.e., lively, active, energetic, and full of high spirit. The **navy blue color** indicates the cosmos of which the NSS is a tiny part, ready to contribute its share for the welfare of mankind.

NSS Day

NSS was formally launched on 24th September 1969, the **birth centenary year of Mahatma Gandhiji**, the Father of the Nation. Therefore, 24th September is celebrated every year as NSS Day with appropriate programmes and activities.

Vision, Mission, and Objectives

Vision

The vision is to build the youth with the mind and spirit to serve the society and work for the social uplift of the down-trodden masses of our nation as a movement.

Mission

The National Service Scheme has been functioning with the motto "NOT ME BUT YOU" to inspire the youth in the service of the people, aiming for Education through Community Service and Community Service through Education.

Broad Objectives

- Understand the community in which they work
- Understand themselves in relation to their community
- Identify the needs and problems of the community and involve them in the problemsolving process
- Develop a sense of social and civic responsibility
- Utilize their knowledge in finding practical solutions to individual and community problems
- Develop competence required for group living and sharing of responsibilities
- Gain skills in mobilizing community participation
- Acquire leadership qualities and a democratic attitude
- Develop the capacity to meet emergencies and natural disasters
- Practice national integration and social harmony

NSS Activity Programmes

NSS activities have been divided into two major groups:

1. Regular NSS Activity

Under this, students undertake various programmes in the adopted villages, college campuses, and urban slums during weekends or after college hours.

2. Special Camping Programme

Under this, camps of 7 days duration are organized in adopted villages or urban slums during vacations with specific projects involving local communities. 50% of NSS volunteers, i.e., 50 NSS Volunteers per NSS Unit, are involved in these camps.

Release of Grants

The grants released by the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Government of India, and Government of Tamil Nadu through the State NSS Cell shall be made available to the NSS Units organizing the camp before the camp actually starts. The university will release the grant admissible to the NSS Unit subject to the conditions of submission of proper accounts by the NSS Unit.

About National Service Scheme (NSS) of ALAGAPPA UNIVESITY

Alagappa University is located in the south-eastern region of Tamil Nadu, India, specifically in the Sivagangai District. The university has **105** NSS units in the Sivagangai and Ramanathapuram Districts, sanctioned by the Government of Tamil Nadu. Out of these, 62 NSS units are distributed to colleges in Sivagangai District, comprising 6200 NSS volunteers,-and 43 NSS units are distributed to colleges in Ramanathapuram District, comprising 4300 NSS volunteers. NSS program officer is deputed to each NSS unit as an additional duty for NSS activities. This is approved by the Honorable Vice-Chancellor of Alagappa University.

Major Activities:

National Integration Camp (NIC)

The National Integration Camp is organized every year, and the duration of each camp is 7

Adventure Program

The adventure activities undertaken in these camps include trekking of mountains, water rafting, Para-sailing, and basic skiing.

NSS Republic Day Parade Camp at New Delhi / State Republic Day Parade Camp at TN

The first Republic Day Camp of NSS Volunteers was held in 1988. The camp takes place in Delhi between 1st and 31st January every year with 200 NSS selected volunteers who are good in discipline, March-past, and cultural activities.

A Contingent of selected NSS volunteers participates in the Republic Day Parade at Rajpath, New Delhi on 26th of January every year in accordance with the guidelines and requisition of the Ministry of Defence.

A Contingent of selected NSS volunteers participates in the State Republic Day Parade at Chennai on 26th of January every year in accordance with the guidelines and requisition of the Ministry of Defence.
