BEST PRACTICE -1

TITLE OF THE	Measurement and Audit of Department Performance- 1000 Points Scale
PRACTICE	Annually.

1. Goals

- i. To instil a sense of commitment to annual performance measurement of individual faculty member and individual department of the University
- ii. To measure performance of individual Department on a 1000 points scale and classify the Departments/Institutes/Constituent Colleges on the basis of scores got
- iii. Toachieveprogressiveimprovementintheperformanceof Departments/Institutes/Constituent Colleges over a period of time.

2. The Context

Anything that is measured improves. Performance measurement and monitoring of faculty members is a sure way of quality enhancement. Results confirm this. A 1000 points scale for Departments, each covering a wide spectrum of performance factors, with different weight as per the NAAC criterion-wise weight, spread out over the Seven assessment criteria of the NAAC, is adopted. For each factor of performance, quantitative levels of performance corresponding to three levels- namely, X, Y and Z levels of performance is fixed.

Further for each performance factor a maximum level of score is prescribed which will go with the Z-level (Triumphant level) of performance on that factor. For Y-level (Talented level) of performance on any factor, 80% of the factor-wise maximum score may be taken credit for. X-level (Threshold level) of performance on any factor carries 60% of the factor-wise maximum score, that is the score for Z level performance. For each department performance score is obtained. The score is vouched and verified yearwise.

Scores of individual Departments may be augmented when the Department's staff members hold additional responsibility or when the Department is lean-staffed/ relatively new Department. Every Department must aim to reach the Z level sooner than later. May be a time frame fixed. Of course opportunities must be made available within the institution. Facilitation is needed. Performance based recognition and reward system can be adopted.

3. The Practice

- i. A standard measurement tool with 1000 points, is used.
- ii. The Heads of Departments are given guidelines to get Performance Report of individual faculty members and that of the Department prepared, along with considered augmentation and to keep them ready for audit with supporting evidences.

- iii. Academic Auditors, mostly internal members consisting of Professors and limited number of external members with rich academic/research background carry out the audit. Prior to audit they are given orientation and after the audit they report to the IQAC.
- iv. The IQAC compiles the Audit reports and carries out analysis.

4. Evidence of Success

The success hinges upon purposeful action. The above exercise is purposeful and hence successful too, evidenced by increased performance scores and more members moving from X to y and from Y to Z level performance.

5. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

No problem, generally. Some auditors were less involved in vouching and verification. Internal Auditors are not given any remuneration. If they are also given a token remuneration of Rs. 1000 to Rs. 1500 per audit, for each annual audit something like Rs. 1,00,000 is required. External auditors' services need about 20,000 inclusive of TA/DA and honorarium. Stationery and consumables might amount to Rs. 25,000. Miscellaneous expenses could sum to Rs.5000. hence a budget of Rs. 150,000 is needed.

6. Notes (optional): The Scale may be re-designed every accreditation/ reaccreditation cycle, to make it contemporary in content and degree of relevance.

- iii. To impart specific knowledge through invited lectures and earnest deliberations on all the Six Nobel Prize Topics that are awarded the Nobel Prize every year.
- iv. To motivate the students, scholars and members of the staff in to commit to path breaking research that might get them world recognition one day or other.

2. The Context

i. The currency of the future, it is said is 'invention and innovation'. The world's every single appreciable development is through scientific/ technological/ economic/ literary/ societal peace related path breaking research exemplary achievement. or Inventive/innovative/constructive minds/brains have toiled for years to make this path breaking research or exemplary achievement possible, under very trying conditions. India is a country great achievement by her people. But it seems, the research and other prize-worth inventive pursuits of our great people of the present time need the finest edge to be worthy of winning Nobel or similar prizes. There is a need for 'competence' backed by 'confidence'. It is necessary the brains of the nation are given a new focus of achieving greatness in their research/ inventive/ innovative/ contributive pursuits.

- ii. The ACT NEXT program is directed at achieving the above said goals through scintillating talks and seminal deliberations on Nobel Prize themes every year. The ACT NEXT was first initiated for Nobel Prize topics of 2014 and that 'ACT NEXT 2014' was the first edition. The programme is being conducted every year on the coveted themes.
- iii. The annual Program, 'ACT NExT' is intended to benefit the faculty, learners, society and all lovers of Invigorating Inventions in Physics, Chemistry and Medicine/Physiology, Copiously Luminous Contributions in Literature, Phenomenal Achievements in Achieving Global Peace and Excelling Works on Economics, merging with our

University's Motto, Vision, Mission, Objectives and Quality Policy through the purposeful 'Talks'.

3. The Practice

- i. Every year all the Departments of the University are divided into six groups and each group is given the favour of celebrating the allotted Nobel Prize Theme of the Six themes that were Nobel prized that year.
- ii. One of the group Departments plays the lead role and other member-departments of the group rendering the support role.
- iii. The University fully funds the ACT NEXT and the expenditure comes to about Rs.50000 per talk-theme.
- iv. Celebrated personalities in each of the Nobel Prize Topics of the year from reputed institutions of higher education/research/industry/polity or any such walk of life are invited to give illuminating lectures on these selected Prized Topics of Nobel prize of the year concerned.
- v. Students, scholars and members of the staff are the major audience and public and any interested persons are also encouraged to participate and share views.
- vi. A souvenir is released as a compendium of each year's ACT NEXT proceedings.
- vii. The IQAC and the Dean of Research take the co-organizer role in each of the six ACT NEXT lectures/talks every year and is pleased to do the compendium preparation.
- viii. Media are involved profusely so that the Nobel Prize culture gets publicity and young minds are drawn more in number and the most in commitment to research and invention.

4. Evidence of Success

The success lies in the fact that lot of awareness and interest that are created. A renewed R&D thirst is developed, research interest is generated, social/national/global concern is developed and so on. There is a knowledge addition for every participant. Respect and appreciation of every Nobel Prize Topic and the great Nobel Prize Awardees are created and this becomes a stirrer of committed research/invention for more number of target audiences of the program.

5. **Problems Encountered and Resources Required** No problem, generally. For each program something like Rs. 50,000 to 60,000 is required. Annual outgo is about Rs 350,000.

6. Notes (optional)

Alagappa University, it is felt, is one of the very few institutions adopting this kind of best practice. It encourages the Affiliated Colleges also to celebrate Nobel Prize Themes with invited lectures and deliberations.
